



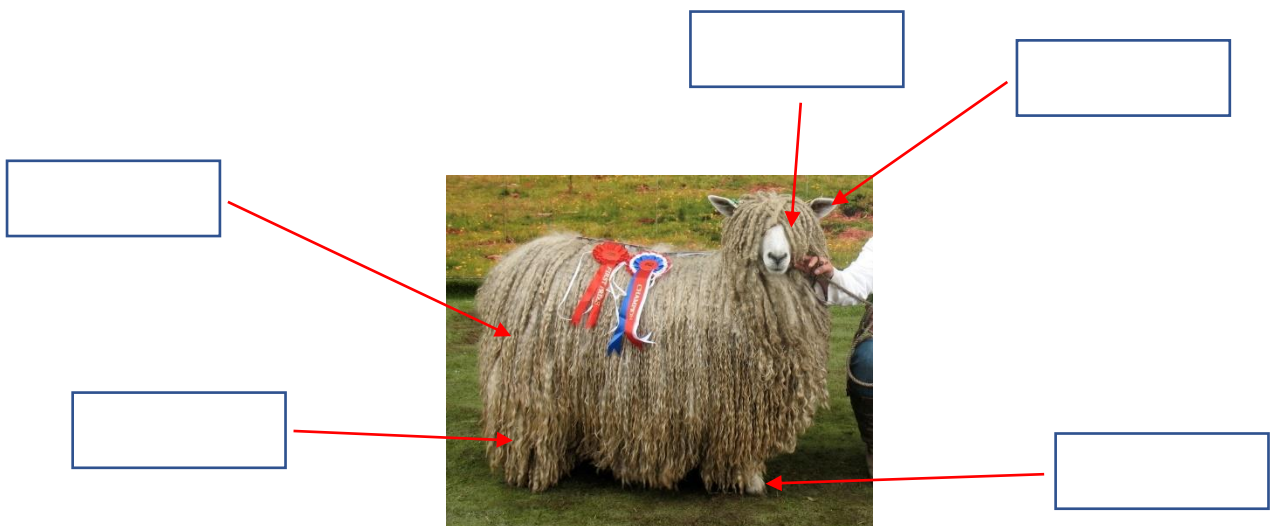
Lincoln Longwool Sheep

The Lincoln Longwool is the largest native sheep with its roots centred in the county of Lincolnshire. A dual-purpose breed recognised by its long, beautiful flowing wavy curls. The lanolin rich wool grows at a rate of 1 inch per month.
